Speed Limits Drop to Boost Pedestrian Safety

During April and May Council implemented speed limit reductions in several suburbs to improve pedestrian safety and driver awareness.

The busy **Sherwood Rd high street** outside Woolies was reduced from 50km to 40km between Oxley Rd and the rail line and 50km west to Dewar Tce. 75% of people that participated in the community survey last year supported a speed reduction and I am pleased that Council has listened and acted.

Everyday drivers are speeding through the zebra crossing putting lives at risk. Interestingly, more people use Sherwood Rd on foot or bike, with a one-day pedestrian count showing 7,813 crossings in multiple points along the block including 207 cyclists, 32 people with a disability, 689 children and 6562 adult crossings. On Thursdays, the busiest day of the week, there were 6,036 vehicle movements recorded.

Hyde Rd, Yeronga is now 50kms along its entire length following the construction of a pedestrian crossing near the shops and **Cansdale St**, home to several sporting clubs, a large retirement village and nursing home, will be reduced from 60kms to 50kms.

Busy **Englefield Rd**, Oxley has been reduced from 60kms to 50kms.

Speed limit changes are made by a multiagency Speed Management Committee comprising Brisbane City Council, TMR and Qld Police following investigation and recommendation by Council.



Parks Upgrades Underway

Dozens of local parks, dog parks and bikeways were flooded and are slowly being repaired and reopened. 860 parks around the City were flood affected. There is a shortage of soft fall so some playgrounds remain closed while supplies are sourced. Parks that remain closed include Cactoblastis Corner, Sherwood due to a major landslip, Ron Goeldner Park playground, Sherwood Arboretum playground, Taylor Bridge playground, Allawah St playground, Paringa Place Park and Fairfield Park. Council advises there are still many weeks ahead before all park facilities are reopened.

In some good news, Council is now trying to deliver on the planned park upgrades this year as well as manage flood clean-up activities. The new \$100,000 outdoor gym has been installed in Yeronga Memorial Park, the \$180,000 upgrade to refurbish and add a new small dog park, new facilities, and lighting to the Fairfield dog park is due to commence shortly and planning is being finalised for the \$140,000 upgrade to the children's playground at Hives Park, Sherwood. A new shade sail will be installed at Ed Kuepper Park, Oxley in coming weeks.

Major upgrades are also underway in the **Sherwood Arboretum** including new pathways, a playground upgrade, nesting boxes, weed removal and mulching

and tree planting. Design and planning is also underway for repairs to the heritage listed rock retaining wall in Yeronga Memorial Park, Ipswich Rd frontage and for a new irrigation system for popular Ken Fletcher Park, Tennyson.

2022 Council Flood Review

Brisbane has been hit again by a major flood causing devastation to homes, sporting and community groups, schools and businesses right around Tennyson Ward. 9 of the 10 suburbs in Tennyson Ward and approx. 3000 homes were flood affected, many catastrophically. As I write this, we are getting another scare. For many people it will be months before they can return home, if at all.

I know many people are still battling with insurers to find out if they are covered or waiting for advice about securing trades to start rebuilding. With insurance premiums out of reach, many families will be relying on the \$771m State/Federal Disaster package which has now been announced. So far, the "Schrinner Council" has refused to reinstate Council's voluntary buy-back scheme or to extend the flood resilient homes to all suburbs in Brisbane. It is heartbreaking to see the Lord Mayor refusing to help rebuild homes that pay huge rates every quarter and instead focus on advertising, junkets and funding for the Olympics.

So much about how this flood has been handled by all three levels of government has been inadequate. From the lack of warning, the lack of ongoing investment in flood mitigation infrastructure, poor planning and development controls and the lack of disaster relief funding so much more needs to be done and done better. That's why I made a substantial submission to Council's 2022 flood review led by former

Supreme Court Chief Justice Mr Paul de Jersey. You can read a summary of my recommendations overleaf or click on the QR code to read the whole submission.

We need to do more because it will flood again. Brisbane was built on a flood plain and severe weather events are increasing in severity due to climate change and exacerbated by inappropriate
